

# Expansion of rehabilitative programming and care for people in the Adult Detention Center (ADC)

- Comprehensive substance use treatment access:
   Continue medications for opioid use disorder programming, along with expansion of integrated mental health care, substance use treatment and recovery supports.
- Enhanced facility safety: A second narcotics detection K9 team was added to the ADC, protecting the safety of those in custody. The K9 teams also support other DOCCR facilities (JDC, ACF)

# Community engagement and education programming

- Relationship building within community:
   Community Engagement Team (CET) continues to build relationships with the community and has expanded education programming with D.A.R.E., Youth Leadership Academy, and the Storytime with the Sheriff's Office program.
- Support beyond custody: HCSO HOPE program will continue to connect individuals to education, employment, and financial guidance both during incarceration and after release.

# Continued partnership focusing on climate action

- Green innovation: The new state-of-the-art Public Safety Services Headquarters incorporates a range of aggressive sustainability and green initiatives: including solar panels, a stormwater management system, and a water reclamation and reuse system.
- Hybrid vehicles: Hybrid vehicle fleet increased to 25 and one fully electric truck

## Challenges and opportunities – retention and recruitment

#### Challenge

Approximately 80% of budget is personnel - many in critical, mandated areas

#### **Opportunity**

Focused recruitment has yielded positive results

#### Challenge

Staffing in critical areas still requires overtime supplementation

#### **Opportunity**

Looking ahead, we aim to leverage staffing studies to evaluate current and optimal staffing levels to best meet the needs of those we serve

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## Challenges and opportunities – technology

#### Challenge

Technology is always evolving and improving, constantly requiring updates, training, and maintenance

#### **Opportunity**

Upgrade and consolidate technologies to improve efficiencies and collaboration opportunities

#### Challenge

The nature of criminal behavior is constantly evolving with utilization of new technologies

#### **Opportunity**

Updating existing software and obtaining new tools is crucial in prevention and response to criminal threats to our residents

## Challenges and opportunities – jail population

#### Challenge

Continued need for detainee annexation because of maximum capacity restrictions

#### **Opportunity**

Continued commitment by system partners to explore and implement strategies to reduce jail population

#### Challenge

Detainees entering our facility continue to require high levels of medical care with roughly 70% of jail population requiring jail health services

#### **Opportunity**

Hennepin County is in position to enact positive and sustained change for detained individuals by leaning into rehabilitative programming and innovative and efficient medical care
