

Purpose of the HUD CoC program & CoCBuilds

- Promote community-wide collaboration to end homelessness
- Provide funding for projects serving eligible homeless populations
- Promote access and use of mainstream resources
- Optimize self-sufficiency for participants



Goals for CoCBuilds competition

HUD Goals

- Increase housing opportunities for people with high levels of need
- Increase supply of PSH for households where a member has a disability
- Encourage coordination between housing, health and service agencies
- Ensure access to resources for PSH in states with less than 2.5M people
- Affirmatively further fair housing

Local CoC Goals

- Increase PSH housing by strategically allocating HUD funds to high need areas
- Advance projects that respond most directly to CoC needs, including needs of populations disproportionally impacted by homelessness
- Support project applications to ensure compliance, competitiveness, sustainability, and alignment with CoC plan.



CoCBuilds

NOFOThe Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) sets for specific guidance for CoCBuilds

Intent: Add new units of permanent housing through construction, acquisition, or rehabilitation

Funds Available: \$175M for ~ 25 projects. Max Hennepin CoC \$7,500,000

Requirements: Projects are required to complete the application for HUD, but apply for through the CoC

Limits: Only 1 project application per CoC unless Tribal coordination

Timeline: Apply by November 2024, Start October 2025. Complete project by September 2030.

Eligible Applicants

Eligible applicants

- Nonprofit organizations
- Public housing authorities
- State or local government, or instrumentalities of state or local government
- Governments and instrumentalities of Native Tribal Nations

MINIMUM standards

- Already have federal funds in the project
- Unique Entity ID (UEID)
- Active SAM.gov registration
- No unresolved civil rights matters
- Not debarred or suspended from doing business with fed govt.
- Has a financial system that meets federal standards in 2.CFR 200.302
- No unresolved delinquent Federal debt



Eligible project types Types/Components

Permanent Supportive Housing only

- Creating NEW units added to response system
- Having these characteristics
 - Offers community-based housing
 - Has no designated length of stay
 - Serves households where at least 1 member has a disability
 - Supports participants to live as independently as possible
 - Requires participants hold the lease (or sublease) for an initial term or at least one year that is renewable and is terminable only for cause



Eligible activities/costs

Capital Expenses:

Acquisition of a property

Construction of a building

Rehabilitation of a building

Must be related to increasing the number of PSH units available. Cannot be renewed

Other Expenses

Non-capitol project expenses (up to 20%)

- Services
- Operations
- Rental Assistance
- Administration (up to 10%)

May only be added to a project with capital costs.

May be renewable in the regular CoC Program coemption on-going



Eligible participants

Eligibility criteria

- 1. Staying in homeless location at entry (Unsheltered or in Emergency Shelter)
- 2. Household member has a disability
- 3. Referred through Coordinated Entry

Coordinated Entry connection

- 1. Prioritize households with high service needs and extensive experiences of homelessness
- 2. Meet minimum HUD eligibility criteria

CoC Project Review How the local CoC will select a project to apply to HUD

1. Eligibility (Intent to Apply)

- Applicant is eligible
- Activities are eligible
- Population to be served is eligible
- · Project Type is allowed
- Project geography is allowed

2. Quality of proposal (100-point scale)

- ➤ Need & Impact of Proposed Project 45 points
- ➤ Strength of Project Team 25 points
- ➤ Anticipated Competitiveness of Project 35 points



Need and Impact of Proposed Project (45 points possible)

- 1. Number of units for target population 10 points (How many people will have housing because of this project?)
- 2. Funding requested per unit 5 points (Is the project maximizing other resources?)
- 3. Housing First/Low barrier 10 points (Will the project eliminate barriers to housing access & stability?)
- 4. Lived Experience involvement 5 points (Has the project sought, received, and used input from people with lived experience of homelessness?)
- 5. Local CoC support 15 points(Does the project align with other affordable housing goals in the community?)



Strength of Project Team (25 points possible)

Developer Experience – 9 points (How likely is the developer to deliver the project on time?)

Property manager experience – 6 points (How likely is the property manager to support compliance as well as PSH outcomes?)

Service Provider experience – 6 points (How likely is the service provider to support participants in housing stability and community connection?)

Team cohesion — 4 points (Is there evidence that the team will work together to deliver a successful PSH project?)



Competitiveness of Project (35 points possible)

Readiness/Timeline – 11 points (Are enough resources secured and planning completed to enable the PSH units to open on time?)

Community Integration – 6 points (Will the project support participants engagement in community and maximum independence?)

Racial Equity – 6 points (How likely is the project team to plan to use the project to advance racial equity?)

Healthcare Services – 6 points (Are connections in place to ensure meaningful levels of healthcare services for participants?)

Rental Assistance – 6 points (Are connections in place to ensure affordability of PSH untis once created?)



CoC Selection

- Projects that pass the Eligibility Review are scored for Quality using the CoC Rating Factors
- The project with the highest Quality score is invited to prepare the full project application and narratives for HUD review
- The project representative(s) works with CoC to develop and submit the proposal to HUD



HUD Review

Threshold Eligibility Review – If eligible, score rating factors

Minimum score for funding = 60

Policy preference points possible (Environmental Justice) = 2

Other considerations:

- Past performance
- Financial stability
- Financial management capacity



Characteristics of selected projects

- ✓ Planned together with people with lived experience of homelessness
- ✓ Experienced partners
- ✓ Partnerships to maximize resources
- ✓ Clear and viable pathway to success
- ✓ Aligned with HUD policy priorities

Steps to Apply to Hennepin CoC

Submit:

- 1. Intent to Apply
 - 2. Project App Questions
- 3. Attach A: MHFA workbook
 - 4. Attach B: Services, Rents, HMIS & Admin

Receive CoC Review and Selection results

If selected, prepare HUD application

- Consult/refine
- Meet with CoC
 - Submit FullProposal



Elements of Full Project Application to HUD

Standard forms

- Application for Federal Assistance (SF-424)
- Applicant and Recipient Assurances & Certifications (HUD-424B)
- Applicant/Recipient Disclosure/Update Report (HUD-2880)
- Disclosure of Lobbying Activities (SF-LLL)
- Certificates Regarding Lobbying Activities
- Grant Application Detailed Budget (HUD-424-CBW)
- Assurances for Non-Construction Programs (SF-424B)
- Assurances for Construction Programs (SF-424D)



Other Requirements

- Certification of Consistency with Consolidated Plan (HUD-2991)
- Code of Conduct if not on file with HUD
- Narrative responses (up to 25 pages total)
 - Advancing Racial Equity
 - Affirmative Marketing and Outreach
 - Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing
 - Project Narrative



CoC Review and Award Selection results – Announcement 1 project will start full application October 11, November 15, Fall 2025 2024 2024 Submit Intent to Submit full October 25, Spring 2025 Start Project application to Apply, Project 2024 Questions, CoC and all Attachment A & B application materials required



Unique aspects of CoCBuilds

- CoC Review is more of a screening process with consultation, not a full application to the CoC
- Project Applicant is the primary writer of the Application, not the CoC staff
- Project Applicant does not have to register in e-snaps or grants.gov to submit application
