Housing

Eviction, foreclosure, repairs, reasonable accommodations

Economic Stability

Health care, education, employment, veterans benefits, social security, consumer issues




Connecting to Help: Law Help MN

Network Overview




CIVIL LEGAL SERVICES PROGRAMS



Delivery Models Along the Continuum of Service



Screening Clients for Service

Criteria Include:

- Income Have income & asset below set limits
- **Priorities** Usually limited to cases that protect someone's safety, stability, health, and shelter
- Merit Cases are screened to see if could be a legal solution to the problem
- Geography Live or have a case venued in that organization's geographic service area
- Capacity The organization must not already be at caseload capacity

Different civil legal aid programs have different standards depending on requirements and restrictions from funders, policies set by their board, etc.

Civil Legal Services Turn away rate - 2022

Minnesotans who apply and are eligible for legal assistance from a CLS organization.



45% receive services




28.6% are fully served Sample data indicates 71.4% of adviceonly cases needed further services.

- free legal services by volunteer attorneys to lowincome people and organizations that serve them
- Legal work to advance civil and other human rights

Pro Bono Attorneys are integral to the work of Civil Legal Aid



Number of MN Pro Bono Cases Closed by LSAC Grantees











Active Pro Bono Attorneys at LSAC Grantees Statewide



Why Volunteer?

- Lawyers are officers of the court.
- It can change lives.
- Lawyers have a professional responsibility to provide 50 hours of pro bono service per year. Minn. Rule of Prof. Conduct 6.1
- Pro Bono qualifies for up to 6 CLE credits per reporting cycle. Minn. CLE Rule 6(c)
- It helps develop skills.
- You don't have to do it alone.

2024 Statewide Pro Se Case Data

Family

Petitioners Had Attorneys in 39% of cases

Respondents Had Attorneys in 32% of cases

Eviction

Landlords Have Attorneys in 84% of cases

Respondents Have Attorneys in 26% of cases



Court Access Initiatives Government Center and Family Justice Center Self-Help Centers

The Self-Help Centers are in place to assist self-represented people as they seek to gain important information and services about their legal problem. Legal information includes court forms and tools to assist with the completion of court forms as well as answers to general questions about court process and procedure.

There are dedicated phone lines available Monday-Friday 10 AM to 3 PM at 651-478-8757.

In person assistance is available Monday-Friday 8 AM to 4:30 PM.

Pro bono lawyers frequently staff free legal assistance clinics at the self-help desks to ensure that people who are unable to afford hiring an attorney can receive legal guidance and advice on their legal issues.

The most common topics at the Government Center are Harassment Restraining Orders and Criminal Expungements.

The most common topics at the Family Justice Center are Divorce and Custody matters.

Court Access Initiatives

- MNDES (Minnesota Digital Evidence System). Establishes a simple, secure, way of managing digital exhibits meant to replace email, network drives, or digital storage devices. Allows users to upload exhibit files without having to visit the courthouse. This initiative is mandatory state-wide.
- Digital accessibility (beginning in 2025 thru 2026). This initiative is purposed to ensure that all external digital content (outward facing public websites, emails, and basic applications) are accessible to people with disabilities.
- A major overhaul is planned concerning the 4th Judicial District website (mncourts.gov). The objective is to streamline all content favoring the use of plain language as well as the general improvement of the ability to link directly to needed content more efficiently.



Hennepin County Law Library

Helped 5000+ patrons in 2024 through experienced reference staff and online & print resources for attorneys and prose patrons.

Piloting "Westlaw Remote Patron Access" which allows non-attorneys and attorneys doing pro bono work to access Westlaw (primary law plus Minnesota Practice) from home.

Works closely with the Court's self-help center and local legal nonprofits (Tom Walsh, Executive Director of VLN sits on the law library board).

Offers free livestream and ondemand CLE courses that appeal to both attorneys and non-attorneys.

The best way to support public law libraries is to use their services!
